PROGRAM

The aim of the graduate program is to teach regional competence for Eastern, Central Eastern and South Eastern Europe.

Over the course of four semesters, you will be required to collect 120 ECTS credits. You can choose two or three subjects from our program.

In addition, you will be required to complete a project course lasting two semesters, intensive language courses, a summer academy in Eastern Europe and extended work experience in a field which is relevant to the course.

You will be taught by lecturers who specialize in Eastern Europe, from Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität in Munich and from the University of Regensburg.

The Graduate School for East and Southeast European Studies, the Collegium Carolinum, the Leibniz Institute for East and Southeast European Studies (IOS), the Institute for East European Law, and the Department Eastern Europe of the Bayerische Staatsbibliothek are all involved in the graduate program.

By the time you graduate, you will have learned to analyze developments and situations in Eastern Europe and place them in their respective political, legal, economic, historic and cultural contexts.

CONTENT

In the graduate program, Eastern Europe is not regarded as a closed space, but seen in relation to Western Europe and other major regions. The course explores the historic variability of the term "Eastern Europe". The curriculum takes an interdisciplinary approach.

The lectures make reference to various countries in Eastern Europe, often comparing them with each other. However, comparisons are also drawn between developments and situations in Western Europe and Eastern Europe.

REQUIREMENTS

Students who wish to embark on this graduate program should have a proven interest in Eastern Europe, have graduated with honors, have a basic knowledge of at least one East European language, speak German fluently and be proficient in English.

We are also interested in learning how applicants are involved in social, community and political work.
